CEO Update

We are just a few weeks away from seeing BLCI's most recent cohort of seniors fulfill their dream and start their first day of school as a college freshman. Our students attend a wide range of colleges and universities, but one thing they have in common is the determination to be the first member of their family to obtain a college degree. While BLCI excels at building the path to education, it is the students who put in the hard work and take advantage of the many opportunities to help prepare them for college and change the trajectory of their futures.



As first-generation college students,

BLCI youth lack generational access to college readiness. Being "the first" means they can't rely on familial support and prior experience to help them navigate the path to college. Without college preparedness programs like BLCI, low academic self-esteem and difficulty adjusting to college can manifest while enrolled, contributing to a lower rate of college completion than that for students who have at least one parent with a four-year degree (Stephens, Hamedani, & Destin, 2014). One of the most compelling outcomes of BLCI's College and Career Readiness Program is the college completion rates. You may be aware that low-income first-generation college students have the lowest expected college completion rate — with just 21% of these students obtaining their degrees. Statewide, regardless of status the statistic is only slightly higher at 55%, yet BLCI students have a college completion rate of 71%. BLCI students exceed the average for *all* segments and more than *triple* the rate of their student counterparts who did not benefit from a program like BLCI. Thank you for investing in and caring for our students.

The first two years of college are the most critical for student success—if students can make it to their second year, they are more likely to complete their educational goals. One of the ways that BLCI promotes college persistence and completion is through our scholarship program. Removing the financial barrier to higher education is key to our

success and students like Valerie, Valeria, Joab, and Diana featured in today's newsletter can immerse themselves in their studies.
